A Note From the President

fter a few delays for each of our flights, Wayne Cotter and I checked into the Hilton Downtown Lexington (I got in around midnight) for this year's Southern Regional Conference for Learning in Retirement, hosted by the Office of Lifelong Learning at the University of Kentucky and sponsored by Osher Lifelong Learning Institute.

The two-and-a-half-day conference offered twenty-three different workshops along with two plenary sessions. Registration was down about thirty percent from last year's conference (205 vs 145) and another dozen had to cancel due to the global technology outage caused by a faulty software update that grounded flights and caused several days of myriad disruptions to our lives.

Wayne and I were there to present "Hybrids: Positives and Pitfalls in a Post-Pandemic World," which was attended by staff and volunteers of twenty-one different lifelong learning programs. Our focus was twofold: (1) to present our all-volunteer governance, operations and curriculum model; and (2) to share how we moved from an all in-person format to all Zoom and then

hybrid in just two short years. Questions from our very engaged audience ranged from the type of equipment we use to how our members actually create and present courses with no paid staff.

Going our separate ways, we had plenty of time to attend a few workshops, such as "Lifelong Learning Curricula Challenges and Opportunities"; "Ways to Keep your Members Engaged Beyond the Classroom"; "Fundraising: Starting and Improving Upon the Journey to Create a Culture of Giving"; "Beyond Zoom Lectures: A Case Study of Online, Live and Interactive Exercise"; and "Marketing by the Numbers." Of Particular Note

 We heard that the executive director or director of curriculum may cancel a course if they feel registration isn't



- sufficient; at Quest, attendance is not a criterion for cancelling and continuing is at the discretion of the lead coordinator.
- We also heard that evaluations of presenters range from a simple "would you recommend this class?" to "how do you rate the teacher's presentation style and knowledge of the subject?" As you know, we don't evaluate presenters.
- We have a longer semester (fourteen weeks) than other programs that limit theirs to a few as three weeks or only six weeks.

This was Wayne's first lifelong learning conference and he noted that "Quest enjoys a far more robust lifelong learning program than so many others that are run by paid professionals and have far more members." He added that "there are so many different lifelong learning programs that you can truly say 'if you know one lifelong learning model, then you know only one lifelong learning model: no two are the same!"

IN MEMORIAM: Loretta Menger

oretta Menger, a Quest member for fifteen years and resident of nearby West New York, New Jersey, passed away on July 10th, at the age of

85. Almost a year ago, she was diagnosed with Stage IV lung cancer, but refused treatment, and had been receiving home hospice care. Then, in May, she fell and broke her hip, and had been at a nursing facility since then.

Loretta was an avid bridge player, active hiker, expert skier, and frequently attended the theater and ballet. She especially enjoyed ushering at ballet performances of The Nutcracker. She traveled widely to many exotic destinations, including a photo safari in Zimbabwe.

Loretta volunteered at the New York Public Library and closely followed politics. She was a major donor to Planned Parenthood, and attended many PP leadership events.

She received a full tuition scholarship for her last two years at Pace University, and decided to give back by establishing the Loretta M. Menger Scholarship Fund for a deserving, hardworking Pace student.

Loretta joined Quest in 2009, made numerous presentations, was a member of the Emergency Response Team, and enjoyed Adventures in Dining events.

Different colored streaks in her hair (the latest were blue) framed her happy face. Loretta will be missed.



The Whitney Biennial provides an opportunity to see what the curators recognize as cutting edge American art. This year's Biennial includes not only up-and-coming young artists but also artists who have had a very long career. Several artists are in their 80's.

The artists selected address different aspects of contemporary conceptions of bodies (be they human, political or social) that are part of our era's challenges and concerns. For example, we saw the fragility of the artist Julia Phillips' own body as a mother in small porcelain casts of her face, breasts and back. There was the strength, determination and immobility of the feminist Harmony Hammond's body represented in a gigantic abstract white painting belted with a large black canvas band and held in place with grommets. And there was a video set up in a circle of odd chairs that looked like a library book club gathering. But, the topic was the difficulty of physically and socially transitioning sexually.

We all agreed on two works that elicited what we consider a normal traditional response to aesthetically pleasing objects. One was a macrame and crochet artist who used wire instead of thread to replicate antimacassars. And the other was Suzanne Jackson's colorful poured and manipulated hangings.

Our docent, Linda Sweet, did a great job of addressing our skepticism about whether every object could really be called "art" by taking us deep into the objectives of the artists and the curatorial perspective on the art itself.

We then proceeded to a perfect apres tour gathering place at Dos Caminos Restaurant for a very convivial lunch.

I DON'T WANT TO MOVE®



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
