In the midst of the excitement and peril of 1950s Formula 1, former racer Enzo Ferrari (portrayed by Adam Driver) finds himself in a crisis. The shadow of bankruptcy looms over the company that he and his wife, Laura (played by Penelope Cruz), had painstakingly built from nothing a decade earlier. Their excursion takes a drastic turn when Louise intervenes to protect Thelma from a man attempting to assault her, resulting in the man's death. Fleeing to Mexico, the two women encounter various challenges, including Thelma's romantic involvement with the charismatic young thief J.D. (played by Brad Pitt) and the efforts of Detective Slocumb (played by Harvey Keitel) to persuade them to surrender before facing

Not yet 40, **Catherine Lacey** is *NOW*, as she asserts "labels are for jars," and cleverly reveals views on AI in her story "Man Mountain" where Burning Man meets Mt. Everest climbs. Raised in a fundamentalist family, receiver of NYPL Young Lions Fiction Award, Lacey understands the complexities of the self. "Everybody I know has multiple, distinct aspects to their personalities, many of them at odds with each other …we contradict ourselves. I'd be very wary of someone who didn't."

2. "People Like That Are the Only People Here", by Lorrie Moore Presented by Steve Allen

**Lorrie Moore** was born in 1957 and raised in the small town of Glens Falls, NY. She graduated from the MFA program at Cornell in 1980 and almost immediately started being published. She writes novels and essays in addition to short stories but is best known for her short stories. She taught creative writing for 30 years at The University of Wisconsin Madison, and for the past ten years at Vanderbilt University. She is widely acknowledged as one of the modern masters of the short story.

Join us for a walking tour of Harlem's magnificent Sugar Hill neighborhood, named for the "sweet life" enjoyed by the African-American middle class. Historic architecture abounds, including free-standing mansions and elegant townhouses.

On this tour, we'll learn about former residents who were important participants in the Harlem Renaissance, including Duke Ellington, who invited us to "Take the A Train" to Sugar Hill in Harlem. We'll visit Sylvan Terrace, a charming block of restored wooden townhouses built in 1882. And no tour of Sugar Hill is complete without Manhattan's oldest house, the Morris-Jumel Mansion. You'll learn about Eliza Jumel, a fascinating woman with connections to many historic individuals, including George Washington and Aaron Burr. Since 2013, Hank Orenstein has hosted a Meetup walking tour group with more than 8,000 members. He is a Licensed NYC Tour Guide, Licensed Real Estate Broker, and a former MSW Social Worker.
