How did he manage to spend nearly five years on the *HMS Beagle*, when he was constantly seasick? Did he actually have his lightbulb moment while visiting the Galapagos? Poster House Museum Tour 'Lester Beall & A New American Identity'

Friday, October 25, 2024, 11:30 AM - 12:30 PM (In-person tour)

Join us and learn about Lester Beal, an American graphic designer and a leading proponent of modernist graphic design. In 1933 President Roosevelt initiated the New Deal, a service of federal programs and agencies designed to spearhead economic recovery. Among the programs created was the Rural Electrification Administration (REA). The REA helped build energy infrastructure in areas where private companies refused to operate, extending electricity to remote areas. Lester Beall was hired to advertise REA's work via a series of posters which provided new and effective visual communications. Through the 1930s and 1940s Beall produced innovative and highly regarded work. Following our tour you are invited to view the museum's newest poster exhibits.
