Pitchfork.com says it "swells in with electronic patterns of flutes and drums that paddle and struggle-like feet against the tide."

First attaining fame as a member of the soul trio Labelle ("Lady Marmalade"), Nona Hendryx later "heard the sound of a new world, one in which technology mediates tenderness. Modern electronics and ancient drums and the timeless demand to love directly, and to be loved in return, have their place here. *Skindiver* is a Black queer epic on a human scale."

Starting in the 1950s when powerful computers were first developed, there has been a strong interest in trying to get computers to play non-physical games, such as checkers, backgammon, chess, and poker. This was both intellectually challenging and a good benchmark for advances in computational theory and technology. Major AI breakthroughs in the past decade have produced programs that can consistently win against world champions in chess, Go, and poker among other games.

This talk will look at the major intellectual advances behind these breakthroughs, the impact they have had upon the game playing communities, and the potential for applications to scientific progress. For example, Demis Hassibis, an AI researcher behind the most advanced chess and Go programs, just shared the 2024 Nobel Prize in Chemistry for research that directly grew out of his work on games.

Belle da Costa Greene: A Librarian's Legacy

Friday December 6, 3:00 PM The Morgan Library Docent led tour

To mark the 2024 centenary of its life as a public institution, the Morgan Library & Museum presents a major exhibition devoted to the life and career of its inaugural **director**, **Belle** da Costa Greene (1879–1950). Widely recognized as an authority on illuminated manuscripts and deeply respected as a cultural heritage executive, Greene was one of the most prominent librarians in American history.

Greene is well known for the instrumental role she played in building the exceptional collection of rare books and manuscripts formed by American financier J. Pierpont Morgan, who hired her as his personal librarian in 1905. After Morgan's death in 1913, Greene continued as the librarian of his son and heir, J.P. Morgan Jr., who would transform his father's Library into a public institution in 1924. But her career as director of what was then known as the Pierpont Morgan Library—a leadership role she held for twenty-four years—is less well understood, as are aspects of her education, private collecting, and dense social and professional networks.

The exhibition traces Greene's storied life, from her roots in a predominantly Black community in Washington, D.C., to her distinguished career at the helm of one of the world's great research libraries.
