CultureQuest: MOMI

Comedy Club by Michael Wellner

ultureQuest organized an excursion to the Museum of the Moving Image (MOMI) in Astoria, Queens. MOMI, established in 1988 and housed within one of the thirteen buildings of the Kaufman-Astoria studio complex, offered Quest members an insightful tour detailing the artistic and technical processes involved in the creation, promotion, and presentation of films, television shows, and other digital entertainment. The group marveled at an exhibition of historic motion picture and television equipment, including early television sets and prototypes of film and television cameras. A nostalgic display of vintage toys, games, and other childhood artifacts evoked fond memories. In the museum's mini-replica of an early 20th-century Egyptian-style movie theater, members were captivated by a documentary on Jim Henson and the Muppets. Prior to the tour, members enjoyed a delightful lunch at Psari, a Greek restaurant known for its fish and seafood.









Let me begin by asking two questions about this great city of ours:
How many of us know anything about the Amateur Comedy
Club, and/or Sniffen Court? And yes, they are related.
Both date way back: Sniffen Court is a small close-ended
mews, running perpendicularly southwest from East 36th Street,
between Third and Lexington Avenues in the Murray Hill neighborhood of Manhattan in New York City. The district, one of the smallest
in New York City, consists of 10 two-story brick stables built in
1863–1864 in the early Romanesque Revival style. The New York
City Landmarks Preservation Commission designated Sniffen Court
as a city historic district on June 21, 1966, and the district was
added to the National Register of Historic Places on November 28,
1973. For those who live on the Upper West Side, Pomander Walk
may be a more familiar similar site.

I mention this because The Amateur Comedy Club, which dates back to 1884, is located in Sniffen Court (150 East 36th Street). It is a (somewhat) unique amateur theater group, that mounts three major productions each year, and also hosts several cocktail parties and similar get togethers during the year. Tickets are not available to the general public, but only to members. Several members actually write and/or perform in the club's shows. As you can imagine, the theater itself is small and intimate, and provides a very different experience from that of the big Broadway theaters.

And, fairly recently, our own **Michael Wellner** became a member, and he and **Gale Spitalnik**, **Leslie Goldman**, **Maureen Berman**, and **Paul Adler** recently attended a performance of the club's latest show, *Sandy Toes and Salty Kisses*. The show was very funny, and thoroughly enjoyed by us Questers, and the larger audience. Our photo was taken in front of Sniffen Court, on a very rainy day.

Culture Quest: Ailey at the Whitney

wenty Questers were guided through the Alvin Ailey exhibit at the Whitney Museum by docent Linda Sweet on January 31st.

Alvin Ailey (1931–1989) is not only an icon of modern dance, founding the internationally renowned Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater, AADT in 1958, he is also among the most culturally, historically impactful artistic figures in the US and the world. "Edges

of Ailey" at the Whitney Museum, is at once a survey and a tribute that unites the stories of how Ailey came to be, the ideas that preoccupied him, and the inspirations behind his visionary choreography and company.

In this exhibition, extensive personal and creative archival material are paired with a looping montage taken from the audiovisual collection of the Ailey archive. These elements provide insights into Ailey's imaginative process and private life, featuring multi-faceted works in a range of media by over 80 artists that share and amplify themes in Ailey's choreography.

The installation features collaborations with Ailey, selections by visual artists, musicians, dancers, and writers referenced

> in his notebooks; they also reflect thematic associations that are at the core of his choreography.

The breathtaking film loop of Ailey in motion sweeps the ceiling of the exhibit and powerfully reflects his unique passion, creativity and singular contribution to American dance.
