Roe was part of a long line of Supreme Court decisions that relied on similar legal theories to establish other privacy and personal autonomy rights relating to child rearing, sexual preferences and marriage. This session will trace the development of the legal claims underlying these rights and evaluate whether they are likely to survive in the wake of Roe's demise.

Author Alice McDermott (born in1953) is a best-selling and award-winning writer who won the National Book Award in 1998. She is most commonly known as a novelist who is a chronicler of the Irish American family. However, in **Post** she is dealing with a completely

different topic, the struggle of living through the Covid-19 outbreak in Williamsburg and dealing with its aftermath.

2. Girl in Blue with Brown Bag by Edith Pearlman. Presented by Steve Allen

This story is from Pearlman's *Binocular Vision*, a 2011 collection of short stories which "lifted her out of relative publishing obscurity to make her an instant if belated literary star at the age of 74." She lived most of her adult life in the Brookline suburb of Boston. "She refined her craft over four decades, publishing more than 200 short stories." Her "characters tend to have dark secrets and sharp wits, and their lives are transformed from the ordinary to the unexpected in a moment" (all quotes from the *New York Times* obituary)

MoMA Tour: Lillie P. Bliss and the Birth of the Modern

MoMA would not be what it is today without Lillie Plummer Bliss. In 1929, after years of advocating for modern art in New York, Bliss, together with Abby Aldrich Rockefeller and Mary Quinn Sullivan, founded The Museum of Modern Art. When she died, at 66, just two years later, Bliss left a large part of her art collection to the museum—a visionary act that fundamentally changed MoMA's trajectory.

Lillie P. Bliss and the Birth of the Modern brings together 40 works from Bliss's collection, including paintings and works on paper by Paul Cézanne, Odilon Redon, Georges-Pierre Seurat, and Pablo Picasso.

Deborah A. Goldberg earned a Ph.D. from the Institute of Fine Arts at NYU. She teaches in the Art History and Fine Arts Departments at the School of Visual Arts in NYC, and lectures regularly at The Met and MoMA.
