#### CultureQuest Goes Backstage at the Opera

n our latest CultureQuest adventure, twenty lucky members got to peek behind the curtain of the world's premier performing arts institution... the Metropolitan Opera House. The iconic lobby is a stunning space, and the massive theater is breathtaking, but all the magic is created behind the scenes. On this special access tour, guests see firsthand how the Opera's extravagant productions come to life in buzzing backstage areas like the scenic and carpentry shops, the wig shop, costume shop, and see where the performers prepare in their dressing rooms.

Many in the Quest community have come to love the Metropolitan Opera House. The performances we've heard there have been dazzling; and if you piggy-back that with the Opera in HD at a local theater, the "cast" interviews at intermission and the 20-minute bird's eye view of the stagehands moving sets between acts, our minds are blown by the proficiency of the organization, and the speed with which it is all accomplished. But for those who attended this backstage tour, our respect notched up a few more levels as we witnessed the extraordinaryprofessionalism and skill of the entire operation. We understood at last what goes into putting ona single MET performance, often two in a single day!

We were divided into two groups of ten, each with a docent. The tour started in the auditorium as the stagehands were assembling

the scenery for Friday evening's *Aida* performance. Today, the stage was brought forward to cover the orchestra pit for extra room during setup. There had to be thousands of wires and cables, lighting supplies, parts of sets and people, all assembled on the stage. Could they possibly know what they were doing? It appeared to be chaos up there. We learned that stagehands have regular rehearsals as they must complete each set up and takedown in 3+ hours, and each of the crew knows exactly what to do and where to find his pieces of equipment. This is not chaos at all; it operates like a perfect symphony.

One docent explained, "There is a "sniper post" very close to the front curtain during each performance that a VIP is in the audience. It looks directly out at the center portion of the parterre level where Presidents and other dignitaries would be seated. The sniper make sure there will never be another John Wilkes Booth shooting at a theater." Yikes!

Mary Ann Grossinger, a new member at Quest, attended the backstage tour. She wrote, "It was an eye opener and a delightful tour. Our guide Helen was a 'tour de force' who guided us through the backstage elevators, pulleys, equipment, and through caverns up and down to the costumes, wigs, carpentry and more. We had a lovely group of Questers and an amazing New York adventure."

# y road to Quest started in Queens, where I grew up and launched my career in communications as a reporter for my hometown paper, *The Bayside Times*, at the age of 15. As an adult,

and after several years living in other states



and countries, I returned to NYC and recently celebrated 48 years in my Union Square apartment.



In 2015, I took an early retirement, obtained my ESL certification, and then taught for several years at the Henry Street Settlement House on the Lower East Side.



Their presentations will bookend the Fall season.

We will begin on September 10 with Andre Aciman, our Kenneth Leedom/Peter Cott Memorial Speaker, discussing his new memoir, *Roman Year*. Aciman was born in Alexandria, Egypt, and is the author of *Call Me By Your Name*, which became an award-winning film. His other books include *Out Of Egypt, False Papers, Find Me, Enigma Variations*, and *Harvard Square*. He is the editor of *The Proust Project* and teaches comparative literature at the Graduate Center of CUNY.

Our season will end on December 10 with Dr. Danielle Ofri, our Jan and Stuart Eisler Memorial Speaker, whose topic is "When We Do Harm: Is Medical Error Really the Third Leading Cause of Death?"

One of the foremost voices in the medical field today, Dr. Ofri has written six books about the doctor-patient relationship. They include *What Patients Say, What Doctors Hear; What Doctors Feel: How Emotions Affect The Practice Of Medicine* and *Medicine In Translation: Journeys With My Patients.* Her articles and essays have appeared in *The New Yorker, The Atlantic, The New York Times, The Los Angeles Times, The Washington Post*, and *The New England Journal of Medicine*, among others.
